

>> C. Humphrey: You mentioned the web guide and by like to talk a little bit about the web guide. We were going to have a demo of the web guide but it wasn't quite ready. So I got the update about where it is. So as most of you know, the NEPA team developed a web guide that goes hand in hand with the handbook, and it's supplemental guidance and it should be available in the next couple months, and what we're going to do is when it's ready we'll have Janice Sloan come down to the Training Center and we'll videotape her giving an introduction, and she'll tell you where it is, how it looks, how to navigate it through and put that on our resource center. The web guide is intended to be available to the BLM and public. It's going to be an interactive document. It can be easily navigated, viewed, searched. The hyperlinks will be hot so you will be able to navigate between the handbook and the web guide. And let's see, the web guide will contain things like -- or does contain things like the CEQ regulations, examples of NEPA documents, any other resources that will be helpful to you as you're preparing documents. I just want to remind you that the examples and resources are not policy, they're not direction, they're just intended as helpful guides that you can use to build upon in using your documents. So again we keep saying that one of the goals is to make you better thinkers, so it's not to take an example and change a few things and there's your document. It's to help you build on to make a better environmental document and better environmental decisions.
